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Bully Pulpit Renovation Update

It feels like a lifetime since I spoke of this project back in February at the NCTGA Annual Conference. Like most of you, 2020 has proven to be a season to remember, or rather forget most likely, for many of the world's citizens. While we've seen booming business in the golf industry from new and returning patrons, I'm sure many can echo the sentiment that the year of Covid has brought on many, many other challenges. In some instances, I do believe we've possibly learned some new efficiencies, but we might also have had to perform some menial tasks due to reduced staffing, delays in spring startup, and so on. I know firsthand that entering a renovation in the

spring of 2020 was going to be difficult.

All in all, everything started out okay. We had hoped to be in the ground a bit sooner than we were, but an open winter in western ND, along with a prolonged cold spring, kept the frost lingering until well into the end of April, thus delaying the jump start on dirt work we had hoped to get. The real saving grace to all of this was we had, and continue to have, little to no rain impact construction. Even with delay of getting into the ground on April 25th, we had high hopes of getting seeded early enough to escape the dog days of summer with young plants. However, some of the uncontrollable events that related to Covid got the best of us. We had a few delays in some irrigation heads that were stuck on shipping docks. Several hired staffers decided to stay closer to home than travel to an unknown destination to work for the summer. And lastly, simply opening the golf course in what was shaping up to be a drought took a lot of our time. This puts us in a bind, thus taking care of live vegetation vs. progress on new irrigation and drainage installation.

Enough doom and gloom! Irrigation installation was completed mid-June, and shortly after the contractors finished up the soil prep. Finally, we had seed in the ground by June 20th. I began to irrigate right on the 22nd of June. Things were good. Germination was quick with the long days and warm nights. By the 25th,



tees had sprouts and greens were showing signs by the 27th. A few spots along the fairways had some signs by the 28th. Then, we had our first rain of the season. A deluge of around a half inch of rain in under 20 minutes, and that proved to be a killer. A lot of seed and soil ran on the newly prepared ground, clogging drainage and silting in low spots. This was a tough scenario as we headed into the hottest, driest part of our season. From the fourth of July through August, the dog days of summer did not disappoint. We continued to repair drainage and seed low areas all through the months of July and August as little to no rain continued to be the norm. And the temps ensued. August was hot, extremely hot. 100 F wasn't unusual. The young turf simply stalled out until the end of August, which we all know is much more conducive to turf growth than mid July. Seed began to germinate again in late August and into the Labor Day weekend. Things were looking good. We received our first measurable rainfall in almost 2 months over Labor Day weekend, and then the frost. Following an inch of rain, ole Ma Nature blessed us with four consecutive frosts and cold days. We're talking low 20's. Soils cooled quickly and the continued inter-seeding slowed down to a creeping halt. Germination had been rapid at about 10 days, but now, especially with the longer shadows, it's much, much longer.

I had hoped to be playing the newer holes by October 1, but it just wasn't in the cards with the adverse growin that occurred. And so, we became a 9 hole golf course on September 27th. Construction on Phase 2, which is the flood mitigation and new holes 7 and 11 began on the 28th. As I begin to write this article on October 8th, our golf contractor is driving our way to begin construction on new tees and greens while the heavy earth contractors are finishing up the earthen levee and the flood gates in the creek. It looks like we are on pace to finish up with the heavy earth by the end of week of October 12th. We are really hoping to get all irrigation installed, and probably dormant seed as much as possible before winter sets in. It'll be a push for sure, but hopefully weather holds. Our fear is that trends possibly change, and we end up getting a much wetter spring than we've experienced in recent history. As I proofread and make corrections and additions today on October 15th, my gut is telling me winter is coming. Snow is now in the forecast, and several nights in the low 20's and high teens are expected over the next ten days. We continue to cross our fingers

that it will warm back up for the first part of November. We've completed two of the three tee complexes and are installing irrigation on them. One of the two greens complexes is mostly ready. Cart paths are being paved starting today, and the box culvert is in the creek and the pipe extensions will be done soon. If weather was still in the 60's we would probably be much more encouraged with the fall.

I've learned a lot during this process, and although there were a few things that didn't go according to plan, it will work out overall in the long run. Being subjected to Mother Nature's bidding leaves us at the mercy of what the environment gives us, and as we know, that is out of our control. While our in-house efforts did save many dollars against the bottom line, it was a taxing endeavor to go forward with. Great experiences were gained, and tests of patience were passed and failed! If I could do one thing over, we'd have been better at shutting down the golf course to 9 holes earlier in September to not be pressing the clock and calendar so badly this late. It really does stay dark late and get dark early by mid-October!

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North Dakota Pesticide Survey



North Dakota Pesticide Certificate Holders With 2021 Expirations:

RE: 2020-2021 Training Season

North Dakota certified commercial/public applicators and dealers will face unprecedented challenges when renewing certificates. The COVID-19 pandemic continues to be a disrupting influence and it will impact how the North Dakota State University Extension Pesticide Program delivers trainings during the next several months.

Our mode of delivery will be vastly different. That is why we put together this publication for all applicators/dealers, regardless of the categories for which you are seeking renewal. I advise you to read this publication carefully so you can plan your strategy for obtaining a renewal of your certification.

We are offering five different approaches for renewing your certification(s).

- 1. Successfully completing exam(s) will be an option through NDSU Extension county offices. Please understand that if you select this method, a county government may institute restrictions that are beyond the control of the state pesticide program. In April and May of 2020, during the height of the pandemic, exams were offered only in Bismarck and Fargo on a limited basis. That may happen again, so remain flexible, look for email announcements on changes, and consult the NDSU Extension Pesticide Program web page for updates.
- 2. Our traditional face-to face trainings will be offered. However, we expect social distancing needs will reduce how many people will be able to participate. At this time, we are planning capacity limits of 50%. For example, if we could accommodate 110 applicators/dealers comfortably at the North Central Research Extension Center near Minot, we would limit participant numbers to 55. To manage for this, we are offering more events and, when possible, we will hold these trainings in larger venues.
- 3. For the past 15 years, we have offered live trainings through web conferencing hosted at selected NDSU Extension county facilities. We will continue to do this. However, due to space limitations because of social distancing, we will limit participant numbers. For example, if we could handle 14 people at LaMoure County, we would expect to allow only seven.
- 4. This past season, we offered live trainings through webinars directly into homes, shops or offices. (In March, April and May, this was the only way we could reach people when face-to-face events were canceled.) We will offer this method of renewal again. The advantage is applicators do not have to travel, but they will need to have a reliable internet connection and a personal computer. This type of training has no limitations on participant numbers. While some may find using this technology challenging, many do not. This past season, we were able to reach nearly 2,000 applicators successfully.
- 5. Finally, in our minor categories (Home Industrial and Institutional, Public Health, Vertebrate and Wood Preservation), we will continue to have home-study correspondence trainings available from Jan. 1 through April 1, 2021.

We can't tell how this pandemic will play out, but we are confident we will be able to meet your certification needs throughout this training season.

Face-to-face Trainings

If you desire to participate in a training in a meeting room, you must consider the following:

- First, if you are part of a COVID-19 at-risk population, consider not participating. Choose alternative options. You can read more on who is most at risk by going to the North Dakota Department of Health's "At Risk Populations Website": https://tinyurl.com/ND-at-Risk-Populations.
- Preregister. Walk-up registrations likely will not be allowed because we will be limiting participation to comply with social distancing.
- If you are not feeling well, please do not attend. In a typical season, having participants who simply "tough out" a bad cold or illness is not unusual. Given the sensitivity people have toward getting COVID-19, coughing or hacking your way through a training at a minimum will make people uncomfortable, or worse, you actually may be spreading disease.
- Please wear masks or face coverings. If you do not have one, we will have a limited supply available at the training. Whether you think this is important or not, our governor is recommending it and so is our NDSU administration. Not wearing a mask puts our ability to conduct pesticide trainings at risk of cancellation, or worse, causing more COVID-19 infections.
- Please maintain a minimum of 6 feet of distance between you and other participants. If the trainer is doing a presentation without a mask, maintain at least 12 feet of distance between you.
- We will have prepackaged snacks and bottled water available at our trainings, but we will not have prepared food or drinks. That includes coffee or cold beverages in a common cooler. If you desire these items, you are welcome to bring your own but they will not be provided.
- We will provide hand sanitizer.
- Please understand the above are minimum expectations. The site host or training venue/operator may have additional requirements that go beyond what the NDSU Extension Pesticide Program is asking. Please respect their wishes.

Communication

This past season, we had to cancel face-to-face trainings and some certificate holders did not get notified. Given the unpredictable nature of this pandemic, please maintain up-to-date contact information with our office, especially an email address. Without it, we will not be able to connect with you on short notice. Also, we can email changes only to applicators/dealers who have registered for an event. If you were planning a walk-in registration, we will not be contacting you.

Another way you can stay in touch is by monitoring our website. We will post any changes at least 24 hours before the event. Look under the COVID-19/Weather announcements. Our home page can be found at http://ndsupesticide.org.

Participating in Webinars

If you select this means of training to complete your renewal, you need to be prepared to handle the technology. Here are some key points for you to consider:

- We will be using Zoom as our webinar delivery platform. We have been using it for several years with Extension's county offices, and this past spring, we used it to reach 2,000 applicators/dealers successfully.
- You do not need a Zoom account or special software.
- You will need a networked computer with audio and video capabilities. A microphone or camera is not required. You must have sufficient bandwidth to handle video streaming.
- A personal computer/tablet/iPad running
 Windows or the IOS system is recommended.
 While Zoom can be viewed from any networked
 device, smartphones are not recommended due
 to bandwidth limitations and the inability to
 see presentations on a small screen.
- If you request participation in a webinar, we will send you additional instruction on "how to participate." This will be in a PDF document and in a narrated step-by-step video.

- You will need to register with Zoom for the event so you can obtain login information. We will provide you with an email registration link once you have preregistered with the NDSU Extension Pesticide Program. When you get the link, simply follow the instructions to obtain login information for your webinar.
- Registering with Zoom allows us to track
 your participation before, during and after the
 webinar. We use this tracking information to verify
 attendance. While participating, please refrain
 from distractions and focus on the content of
 the training. Doing so will assure the U.S.
 Environmental Protection Agency, the North
 Dakota Department of Agriculture and the
 general public that you are committed to
 using pesticides in a responsible manner.

Completing Exams at County Extension Offices

Renewal by examination will be offered again beginning January 1 through March 31, 2021. For 40 years NDSU County Extension Offices have provided local opportunities to take certification exams. At the time of this writing, this is still the case. However, while they are part of the NDSU Extension System, their operations and practices are governed by county government. Thus, each office may have different requirements and procedures for issuing exams. If this pandemic intensifies, counties may not issue exams for an undetermined period of time. Regardless, applicators/dealers seeking to take exams should call ahead for an appointment and visit with county staff regarding availability and local policies.

No Continuing Education Units for Certified Crop Advisors for 2020-2021

A casualty of this pandemic is our ability to get approval for and verify participation in our trainings for purposes of CEU accreditation. The logistics of doing so adds another layer of complexity to the management of our trainings. So, in the interest of focusing only on our core mission, we will not be offering credits this season. We expect that we will do so next year, assuming this pandemic subsides.

Expect the Unexpected

The reality of COVID-19 is the volatile nature of this pandemic. One can speculate about how this will impact our state and country, but seeing the future is not knowable. We are preparing as best we can and if we have to deal with shutdowns and/or cancellations of face-to- face events, we will try to convert them to a Zoom Webinar. Our experience suggests we can shift our mode of delivery on very short notice. So if you are going to participate in a face to face event, be prepared to go "on-line" if necessary for the originally planned date.

Lastly, get your certification requirements done sooner rather than later. On April 1, 2021 your certifications will expire. Waiting until March 31st to act may not be a good strategy.

Training Registration

Preregistration is required for all trainings. Due to COVID-19, walk-in registration may not be available.

Telephone registrations are not accepted.
